

St Edmund's School is a 2-18 independent, coeducational, HMC day and boarding school. Our Nursery & Pre-Prep, Junior and Senior Schools are all located on the same site in Canterbury. This year, St Edmund's is celebrating its 275th anniversary. The school aims to be a caring and disciplined community informed by Christian principles that encourages pupils to become 'the best that they can be'. It seeks to enable pupils to take pride in their achievements, be humble and responsible members of society and leave equipped to make a success of their personal and professional lives. During the headship of Edward O'Connor, school numbers have climbed to record levels (currently 650) and St Edmund's is known for being a friendly, academically ambitious and creative community. St Edmund's was judged as excellent on all measures in its most recent ISI inspection and won the Independent School of the Year Award for Performing Arts in 2023. In March 2024, the school received a NACE Challenge Award in recognition of outstanding provision for able and gifted students. This summer work will be completed on Academic Hub Phase 2 – a new state of the art classroom block.

Drama is at the very heart of our curriculum and we have a formidable reputation based on years of ambition, innovation and hard work that we want to develop even further. Our department strikes an extraordinary balance between high level productions and practical work (that would grace professional theatres) and maintaining an inclusive approach that seeks to encourage young people of all ages and ability to participate. Our recent whole school productions have included Chicago, Beauty and the Beast, Time and the Conways and Oliver! This year we are tackling Sondheim's Assassins. In class, students are encouraged to learn a range of theatrical styles drawing inspiration from practitioners as diverse as Artaud, Frantic Assembly, Stanivlaski, Mischief Theatre and Brecht. We have also run a hugely successful summer arts festival since 2017 that gives an opportunity for experimental and challenging work. In recent years we have offered productions such as Grimm's Fairy Tales and The Language of Art. We were awarded the Independent Schools Award for Performing Arts School of the Year in 2023. This year we celebrate our 275th anniversary. It is a time for reflecting on (and celebrating) how far we have come, but it is also an opportunity for re-imagining our future role and identity. Drama is at the heart of our identity and the new Director of Drama will have the full backing of the School Leadership to build further on our superb foundations. The aim, as always, is to become the best Drama department in the country. We will be delighted to receive applications from candidates from a wide range of backgrounds. THE DRAMA DEPARTMENT

INTRODUCTION

St Edmund's has an exceptional reputation for its Drama, both in terms of academic teaching and of the outstandingly high quality school productions it regularly offers. We are proud to be the Independent Schools Awards Performing Arts School of the Year for 2023-24.

Our major shows attract capacity audiences. There is strong support, too, for the public performance of pieces being offered by examination classes for external moderation. Such exam-focused productions are challenging and creative, the product of outstanding teaching. They often produce genuinely innovative, ground-breaking dramatic performances.

Drama has a wide appeal among the pupil body. Auditions for school productions generate great excitement and attract vastly more applicants than can usually be accommodated! Sets for the GCSE Drama option are always heavily subscribed.

The department encourages pupils to witness a variety of theatrical styles and experiences by taking frequent trips to the professional theatre, both locally and in London. Visiting theatre companies are also encouraged to come into the school when possible. The Department also runs regular overseas trips – in recent years visiting New York, Los Angeles and Krakow.

We have an exceptional backstage operation too. Our technical systems are excellent and our team creates its own sets and costumes to remarkably high standards.

Feedback from moderators is exceptionally positive: on several occasions in recent years the full cast of test pieces have been awarded maximum marks, with comments from the examiner that many candidates were "off the scale". This is the case across the full range of GCSE, AS and A2 work. The department expects its pieces to be assessed as Band 1 – it is very rare indeed that they are not.

This is an outstanding department by any measure.

THE DRAMA DEPARTMENT

FACILITIES

The school has a 350 seat proscenium arch theatre, which forms part of the Francis Musgrave Performing Arts Centre. It has an unusually large stage area and excellent technical systems.

Teaching takes place in the theatre, the adjoining space (known as the Exhibition Area) and in the air-conditioned Recital Hall (in the Music School), which has a sprung floor and wall-length mirrors.

COURSES

At Lower Fifth (year 9), Drama is taught as non-examined subject and is designed to foster self-confidence and improve communication skills.

The GCSE Drama course is an extremely popular option in the Middle and Upper Fifth years (10 and 11). Results are consistently outstanding and among the very best in the country on a value-added basis.

Drama A-Level offers sixth form pupils the opportunity to specialise their skills and several pupils progress to university or to specialist Drama Schools. The department is experienced in preparing pupils for prepared for National Youth Theatre, University and Drama School auditions. Recent St Edmund's pupils have progressed to ALRA, Rose Bruford, The Royal Welsh, Guildhall and The Actor's Studio in New York.

Perhaps St Edmund's most famous former pupil is the Hollywood actor Orlando Bloom.

- Excellent knowledge of wider technical aspects of production
- Personal dynamism together with an ability to engender enthusiasm and motivate pupils and staff at all levels
- An approach to teaching that is inspirational and pupil focused
- A degree in a subject closely-related to Drama
- An excellent level of current subject knowledge, including the ability to teach A-level Drama to the highest grades
- The ability to stretch and challenge the most able pupils
- Experience of teaching Drama to public examination classes
- The ability to deal confidently with sensitive issues concerning safeguarding and pupil welfare
- The ability to communicate effectively and accurately
- Excellent management skills
- The ability to relate well to pupils of all abilities and to a wide age range

The desirable qualities of the successful applicant include:

- Demonstrable leadership qualities
- A formal teaching qualification
- Experience of preparation of pupils for university entrance and on applying to drama schools
- Familiarity with GCSE and A-Level Drama syllabuses
- Record of success in increasing the uptake of drama as a subject.
- A knowledge of national developments in the teaching and examining of Drama
- An ability to work collaboratively (for example, with the Director of Music)

JOB DESCRIPTION

The Director of Drama is responsible for:

- The inspirational leadership of the Drama department
- Articulation of the vision for Drama throughout the school and externally
- Overall co-ordination of curricular and extra-curricular drama activities
- Responsibility for co-ordination of all extra-curricular workshops and production work
- To take personal responsibility for all major, at least annual, school productions
- To play a key role in the planning and delivery of the St Edmund's Festival
- The provision and maintenance of current Drama syllabuses for each year in the Senior School
- Overseeing the setting and marking of internal examinations within the department
- Attending Heads of Department meetings to discuss academic policy and curriculum development
- Liaising with the Stage Manager and any staff associated with productions
- Teaching and co-ordination of GCSE and A-Level Drama
- Monitoring the quality of teaching in the department, and ensuring that high standards of teaching (including the setting and marking of work, and classroom management) are maintained
- Financial and organisational management of the Department
- Holding regular departmental meetings
- Ensuring that work is set for any departmental member absent from school
- Providing an annual written report to the Deputy Head (Academic) analysing and reviewing the performance of pupils in public examinations
- Advising on matters relating to departmental staffing, and the appointment of staff.
- Liaising with Special Needs teachers, e.g. SENCo, EAL
- Arranging auditions for applicants to the school and scholarship candidates, as necessary
- Overseeing the appraisal and professional development of departmental members
- Maintaining knowledge about curriculum developments and syllabus changes nationally
- Encouraging cross-curricular teaching and learning, as appropriate
- Ensuring departmental practice complies with the schools' Health & Safety Policy
